General Safety Information

The health and safety of visitors is of our utmost concern. We have tried to make the ship as safe as possible but due to the age of the vessel, we ask that you take special care during your visit.

HMS Unicorn contains:

- Steep stairs
- Trip hazards
- Low ceilings
- Narrow & low doorways
- Low light levels
- Decks that can be slippery when wet

Children must be supervised **at all times** when on board the ship and remain the **responsibility of the school or group** throughout the visit. We also insist on a minimum ratio of one adult leader for every ten children, or one adult leader for every six children if the group are aged five or younger.

Every group will be provided with a risk assessment before visiting the ship. We also advise a free preliminary visit for teachers and leaders, to familiarise yourself with the site and carry out your own risk assessment. These can be arranged with our Learning & Engagement Officer.

Information on Visits

Arrival

Entrance to HMS Unicorn is via the main gangway onto the Gun Deck. When you step inside the ship, please make your way to the Welcome Desk immediately in front of the doorway to inform a member of staff that you have arrived.

We always recommend that groups come dressed in warm clothing and suitable footwear.

The Ship

When visiting the ship, children must be supervised at all times and remain the responsibility of the teachers and/or adult leaders.

If the behaviour of anyone in a group adversely affects the ship and its collection or the safety or enjoyment of other learners, visitors, or staff, we may require the group to leave.

Please always advise children to stay with their group, to avoid the risk of accident or injury.

Visitors should always behave in an appropriate manner and walk around the ship – please do not run!

All HMS Unicorn staff and volunteers are in uniform and wear identification badges. They are always happy to help with any issues.

Workshops

A variety of workshops are offered on board HMS Unicorn for learners of all ages and are designed to support the Curriculum for Excellence.

Workshops last around 30 to 45 minutes and must be arranged in advance with our Learning & Engagement Officer.

Toilets, Lunch & Shop

Toilets are in a building on the dockside beside HMS Unicorn.

If you wish to eat packed lunches or snacks on the ship, then please inform the ship's staff beforehand so an area can be set up for this.

The shop is located beside the entrance to the ship on the Gun Deck and stocks pocket-money items. Alternatively, we can provide 'Goody Bags' for your group and this can be arranged through our Learning & Engagement Officer in advance of a visit.

Evaluation

We always value feedback on visits. You and your group may be asked to fill in evaluation forms or an online survey to help us monitor our work.

We also encourage groups to share their experience online via our Facebook, Twitter, or Instagram page.

Photographs

Visitors can take photographs and reuse for educational purposes.

Accessibility Guide

We want everyone to be able to enjoy their experience on board HMS Unicorn. Our staff and volunteers are always happy to offer any help you need during your visit.

As HMS Unicorn was built for a different age, there are no lifts or elevators and accessibility between the decks on board is via ladder ways.

Visitors with Additional Needs or Medical Needs


HMS Unicorn does its best to accommodate the requirements of all visitors.

Group leaders should assess the risks and consider if additional supervision is required.


Please contact us in advance to clarify what provision can be made for members of your party who have additional needs or to discuss any serious medical conditions or requirements.

Map of the Ship


Upper Deck




Gun Deck


